The Crest

The Flinders University Council adopted a coat of arms for the University on 16 December 1966.

The coat of arms consists of a shield bearing a radiant sun at the base surmounted by an open book on a blue background, with an extract from page 176 of Volume 1 of Matthew Flinders' A Voyage to Terra Australis printed on the open pages.

The shield is surmounted by a crest comprising a reproduction of Flinders' ship *Investigator* fully rigged, on a wreath of the University's colours of dark blue, pale blue and white.


The Crest was designed by Kevyn Graham Whisson.

Academic dress

The history of academic dress spans a period of more than 600 years from the earliest days of universities to present. The tradition of wearing academic dress continues in universities around the world.

At Flinders University, the wearing of a hood by the graduate to indicate their College is the principal feature. The hood of Flinders' academic dress is a dark blue. The colours of the hood's lining and piping are prescribed by the University and distinguish the different award and College.

Graduates who identify as an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander Australian are entitled to wear a stole of either Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander colours, worn over the gown and under the hood.

Blue for College of Business, Government and Law
Orange for College of Education, Psychology and Social Work
Yellow for College of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences
Green for College of Medicine and Public Health
Red for College of Nursing and Health Sciences
Purple for College of Science and Engineering

Academic dress is made up of three parts; the **gown**, the **hood** and the **cap**. The cap is a black mortarboard with black tassel, unless graduating with a doctorate, where a black velvet bonnet with a black cord is worn.

Graduates - Doctor of Medicine

Flinders University is recognised globally as a leader in medical education and universities worldwide have adopted the curriculum of our medical program. The program integrates clinical medicine with a strong underpinning in the relevant biomedical sciences, while also providing students with a broader understanding of health in a range of social contexts, with a commitment to social justice and equity.

As a professional qualification, the Flinders University Doctor of Medicine (MD) is accredited by the Australian Medical Council to deliver outstanding clinical and academic training, ensuring students are well prepared for the challenges of internship and future professional training.

The Northern Territory Medical Program (NTMP), which commenced in 2011 in partnership with Charles Darwin University and the NT Government, has enabled the full four years of the Flinders MD to be taught in the Northern Territory. Over the last decade, 24 Territorians each year have the opportunity to study to become a doctor without having to leave home. The MD provides high quality accredited medical education to local students. Curriculum delivery is innovative, using the latest technologies to ensure quality teaching across the Australian Central Corridor in a variety of settings, preparing a fit-for-context medical workforce for rural and remote Australia and Indigenous Australians. Building on 40 years of success, students learn on Flinders campuses and in partner health services in Darwin, Alice Springs, Katherine, Tennant Creek, and Nhulunbuy, as well as some of the most remote primary health care centres in Australia. The NTMP taps into the deep vein of clinical and public health expertise of local practitioners who are national and international leaders in their field.

While graduates are skilled to practice anywhere in the world, the contextualised curriculum of the NTMP ensures that we produce graduates who are Territorians and Aboriginal and Torrs Strait Islander people trained in the Territory, for the Territory.

Celebrating 25 years of impact and partnership in the NT

Celebrating 10 years of the Northern Territory Medical Program

This year we have hosted a series of celebrations to mark the 25th anniversary of the NT Clinical School and Flinders in the Northern Territory.

Our accomplishments have been extraordinary. Over the past 25 years Flinders has served the Territory through the Clinical School in Darwin, the Rural Clinical School (Alice Springs, Katherine, Nhulunbuy and Tennant Creek), the University Department of Rural Health (UDRH), the Rural Interprofessional Placement Learning program (RIPPL), the Remote Primary Health Care suite of manuals (RPHCM), the Remote Health Practice Program, the Johanna Briggs Institute Centre of Excellence Mparntwe Centre for Evidence in Health, Poche SA+NT. the Indigenous Entry Stream, the Regional Training Hubs (Alice Springs and Darwin), the Katherine Remote Interprofessional Student Placement Program (KRISPP), membership of Central Australian Academic Health Science Network (CA AHSN), and an ever expanding portfolio of community driven research. In 2021 we celebrated 10 years of the NTMP. Since the program's inception, the NTMP has been providing nearly 50% of the new interns required in the Northern Territory. Graduates to date have included 15 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander doctors, with more conferred at today's graduation celebration. With 20% of graduate entry students identifying as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people, the NTMP has the highest percentage of Indigenous students in each intake of all medical programs in Australia.

Most importantly, we have delivered on the primary aim of the NTMP: to produce graduates who are fit-forpractice in the unique context of remote and Indigenous Northern Territory communities.

Flinders is successful in the Northern Territory because of the dedication, goodwill and vision of a collective of students, teachers, clinicians, researchers, academics and professional staff who are steadfast in their commitment to the provision of high quality health care and equitable access to education for our communities in the NT.

To highlight the incredible work of this collective, we have developed a 25 year celebration book that tells individual stories of some of the people who have conceptualised, developed, supported, taught and studied at Flinders in the Northern Territory. These pages provide a sneak peek into the book content's and highlight some of the incredible stories that embody Flinders University's contributions to the Northern Territory and to rural and remote health.

"We are still the most disadvantaged people in Australia, and that's not acceptable, but it will take a massive effort of both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people to make change. That's why I became a cultural educator, equipping doctors and nurses with knowledge to go out into communities, so they understand what they can experience and immerse into our lifestyle and better

"I was worried that I wasn't smart enough for medicine.

"Then a few people around me said, 'Just do it, give it a go and if it's too much, you can always leave.' Within a few weeks I started to realise it is hard, and there is a lot of time and effort involved, but it's definitely manageable. I realised that with the Indigenous pathway program, I came into the course just as prepared as everybody else. I am confident now that I will graduate with a whole range of skills that will help me become a confident and competent doctor for all of my future patients, and in particular for my Indigenous patients."

"Our society can't change if we are not aware of the problems and prepared to face up to them and own them. Reconciliation is about working out where things have gone wrong and recognising that. There isn't a need to beat each other over the back; the biggest thing is to come together and move forward together.

"Through the NTMP I can influence a curriculum, set priorities, and drive a focus on integrating how individual patients and people influence the learning of the doctor. I also am recognising the need to give more access to Aboriginal people in our program to translate real everyday issues for students and to carry the humour and stories of the human condition into the program, so that it is real."



"If I can change one person's mind and get them thinking outside the box, realising Aboriginal health is not as simple as you might think it is, then I am happy. If I can do that for a whole class, I am even happier!"

"I love teaching. I want to give medical students the opportunities to learn what Aboriginal health means from an Aboriginal perspective, taught by an Aboriginal whose community lives with and is impacted by the health problems that we talk about."
